Making Sense of Allyship: The Marriage between Theory and Practice

Social change can be a difficult landscape to navigate when you are outside of the communities that you are trying to support. You want to do something to help, but worry that you might do the wrong thing. You want to speak up, but not speak for. You know that inaction itself is complicit in systems of oppression, but you feel unsure how to act. If this resonates, this session is for you. This session is designed to bridge the gap between the theory and practice of allyship in academic and professional relationships. It will involve a mixture of activities for interactive engagement and levels of accessibility. This session will bring together the group's

collective expertise and experiences as a catalyst for further self-reflection, development, and making informed, affirmative actions. The session will include:

- Why allyship?
- What is allyship? And what it isn't
- Allyship actions

Heritage Pathway Workshop: Curating for Change-Interpreting Disability Histories

This interactive workshop at the Ashmolean Museum will introduce participants to curating and interpreting inclusive histories of disability within established museum settings. This session will be led by Kyle Lewis Jordan who is the Curating for Change Fellow working with both the Ashmolean Museum and Pitts River's Museum in Oxford.

The Curating for Change programme exists to create strong career pathways for d/Deaf, disabled and neurodiverse curators, currently seriously under-represented in museums. Working with a range of museums across the UK, the Curating for Change Trainees and Fellows are producing exhibitions, events and blogs, exploring disabled people's histories – while gaining skills for careers in the sector.

Research Interviews: Styles and Techniques

With all of this in mind this session will also

introduce some of the ethical dimensions that different researchers will need to consider when using this data collection technique.

Have you ever watched an amazing presenter build a relationship, a connection, with their audience and wondered how they do it? This workshop focuses on how to give a good presentation rather than what makes a good one, can help you identify your authentic style and provides you with a set of practical tools with which to approach your next presentation.

We will go beyond superficial discussions of speaking pace, good eye contact, and adopting open body language to explore how you can use internal and external resources to create impact in your presentations. It releases you from many of the myths around public speaking and explores what we do intellectually, emotionally and physically when we communicate effectively.

Funding Call: TORCH Critical Thinking Communities

Deadline for applications: Friday 27th October, 5pm

TORCH invite applications for a funding initiative open to Oxford DPhil candidates looking to collaborate with other students across faculties and divisions: the "Critical–Thinking Communities" fund. These communities will be able to critically consider historical, cultural, or aesthetic ideas or methodological issues. TORCH is particularly keen to receive applications that take a culturally diverse and/or transnational approach to an issue or set of related questions. Participants must include Humanities students, but can also include students from other divisions.

Successful applications will receive max. £500, which should be for activities to be completed by **31 July 2024**. Funds can be used to cover expenses related to the running of reading groups, workshops, and other discussion forums. We do not typically fund other websites, as we offer space on the TORCH website.
